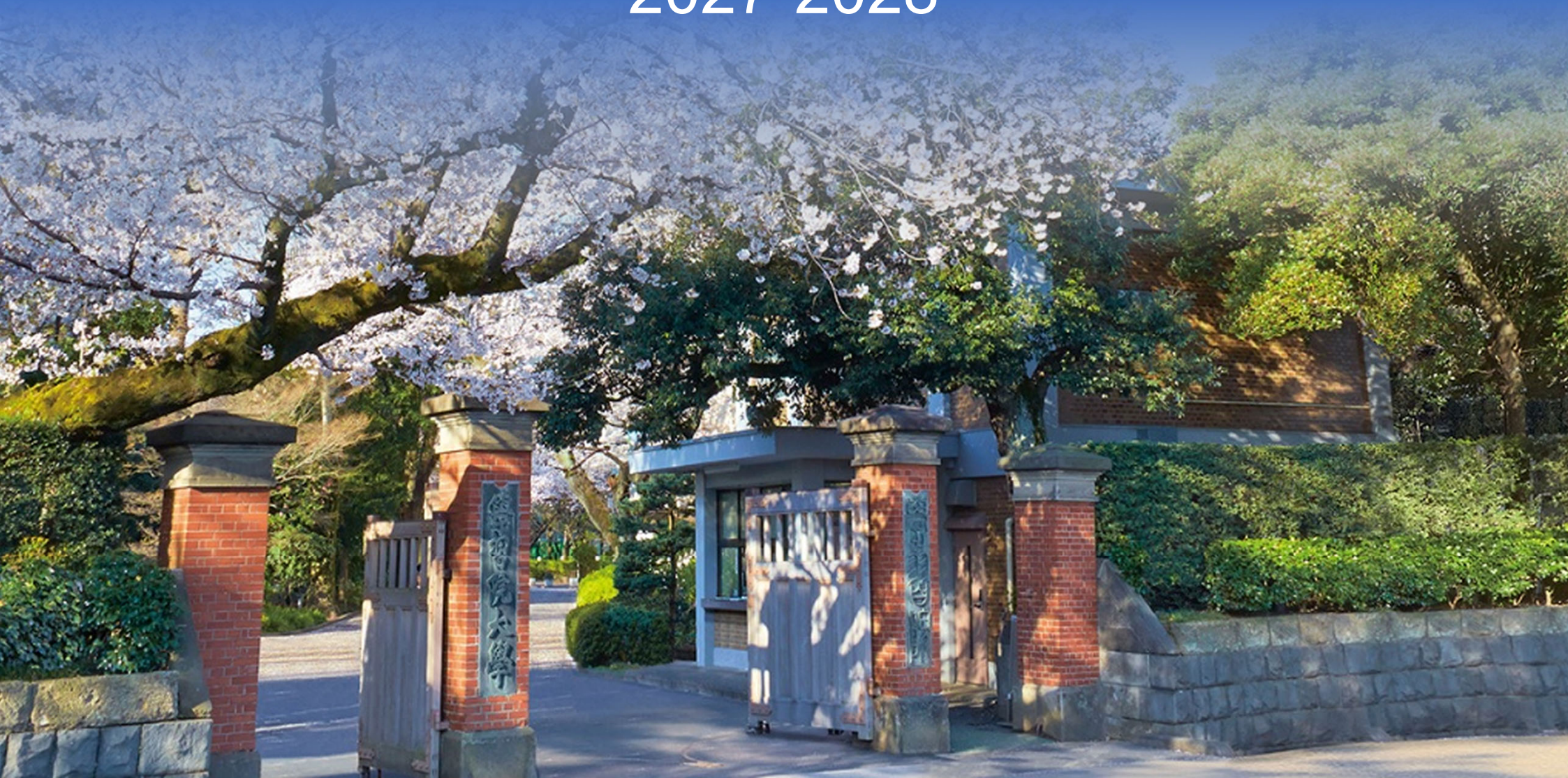

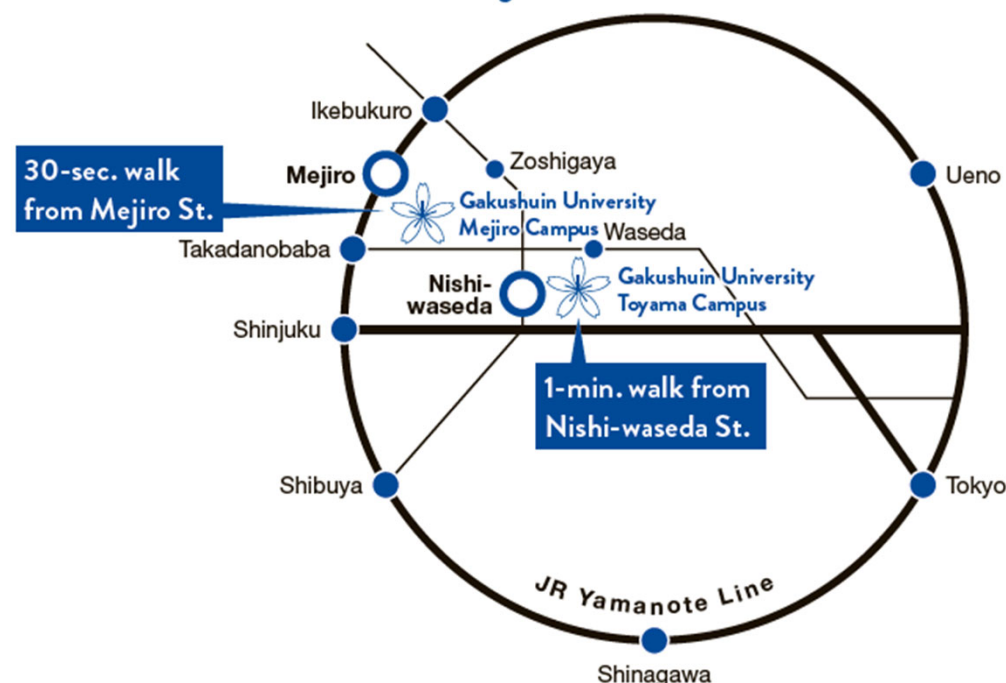

The Faculty of International Social Sciences offers courses in the following fields, which are taught in English and are taken by many exchange students every year.

These courses are also open to students outside the Faculty of International Social Sciences.

【Examples of Courses Offered】

Field	Course example	Content	Semester
Law	Corporate Finance and Law	This course explores the legal, economic, and policy aspects of corporate finance. Based on a business school textbook, it includes some numerical analysis, so students should be comfortable with numbers.	First semester
	Asian Business Law	This course will outline legislation policies and the role of laws in different countries (mainly Southeast Asian countries), the issues and challenges faced by multinational corporations, and the strategies for enterprises to navigate in an integrated world.	Second semester
Economics	The Economic Development of Japan	The aim of the class is to understand the Japanese economic and social development by applying the standard economic analysis and the data. Several aspects of the development and characteristics of the modern Japanese economy and society will be analyzed and discussed in the class.	First semester
	Japan in the World Economy	This course provides lectures on the Japanese economy in the context of the world economy. Various topics are covered in this course such as exchange rates and trade policies. The effects of global issues such as decarbonization on the Japanese economy are also addressed.	Second semester

International Centre also offers courses conducted in English (or English and Japanese).

These courses are designed to provide students with multifaceted perspectives on Japan.

【Examples of Courses Offered】

Course name	Content	Semester
Japan StudiesIII : Contemporary Japan and Society	This course provides an opportunity to observe and analyze people's conduct and/or language usage in contemporary Japanese society. As one approach to examining these issues, you will be introduced to the basics of qualitative research methods, which allows you to see the world surrounding you more critically and deeply. By applying some of these methods, you will design and conduct group research projects to investigate socio-cultural aspects of Japan observed in your everyday life.	First semester
Japan StudiesIV : Art, Culture and Communication	This course aims to explore Japanese everyday interaction from various socio-cultural aspects that may affect speakers' ways of interacting with others. By analysing it in detail, comparing it to practices in other languages, and sharing experiences and opinions with classmates, you will gain more insight into how people select their words and expressions and thereby perform social actions. You will see socio-cultural phenomena of Japanese communication from a wider perspective, while observing and analysing your own language use and its possible impacts on others.	Second semester

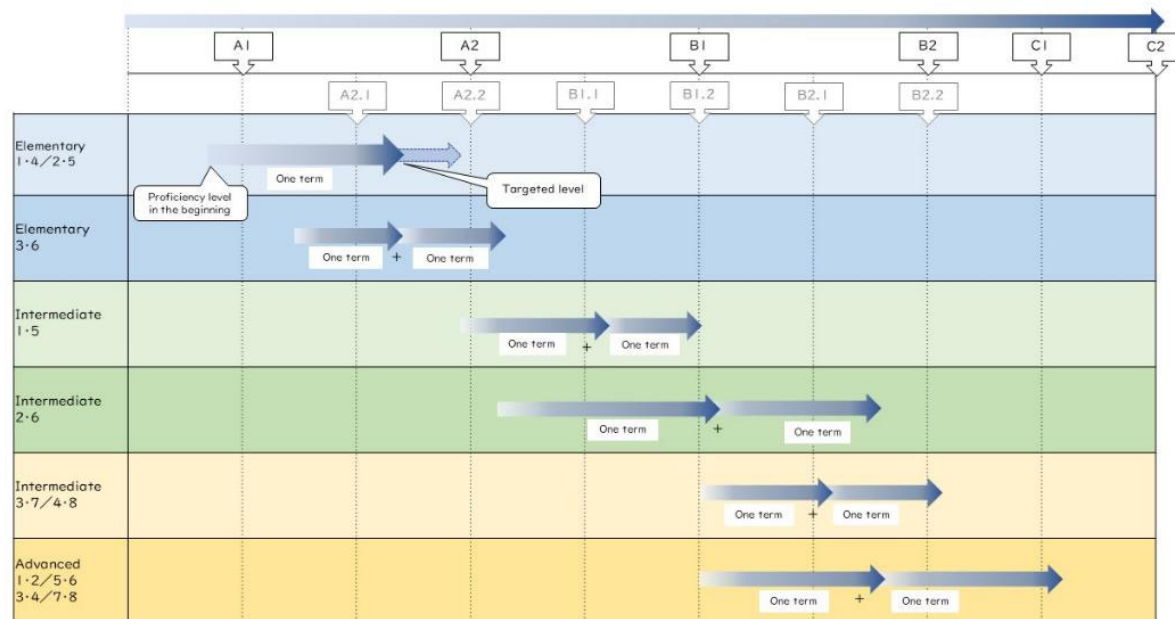

Japanese language classes are offered on both campuses.
Students must take classes on their main campus.

2-1. At Mejiro Campus

- ① The Japanese language programme offers three proficiency levels: Elementary, Intermediate, and Advanced
- ② Small classes of around 10 students
- ③ Classes are taught by experienced instructors in a supportive learning environment.



2-1. At Mejiro Campus

Elementary course

Assuming that enrolled students can read and write hiragana, katakana, and about 50 kanji, the elementary courses aim to help students acquire the basic level of Japanese language needed for daily life. (Proficiency target: a vocabulary of approximately 1,500 words, basic grammar, and 300 kanji.)

Intermediate course

Intermediate courses aim to help students acquire language skills sufficient for daily life, general conversation, and understanding simple texts. (Proficiency target: 6,000 words, intermediate-level grammar, and 1,000 kanji.)

Advanced course

Advanced courses aim to help students learn how to use Japanese in a variety of complex situations. Participants also acquire the language skills required in academic contexts, such as seminar presentations and report writing. (Proficiency target: a vocabulary of more than 10,000 words, mastery of advanced grammar, and more than 2,000 kanji.)

2-2. At Toyama Campus

Japanese language class placement at the Faculty of Intercultural Studies is conducted on a relative basis, with consideration given to the overall Japanese proficiency levels of the exchange students accepted in each academic year. The level of each class may differ slightly from year to year depending on the composition of the incoming students.

Classes A

Classes A are designed for students who have already passed the JLPT (Japanese Language Proficiency Test) N2 level and are aiming for N1. In some classes, we also provide training to acquire the skills necessary to attend university classes conducted in Japanese.

Classes B

Classes B are designed for students who have already passed the JLPT N3 level and are aiming for N2.

Classes C

Classes C are designed for students who have already passed the JLPT N4 level and are aiming for N3.

3-3. Credit System

Under the university's academic regulations, 1 credit is defined as 45 hours of total study time, including both in-class instruction and independent study.

Most courses award 2 credits per semester (90 hours of study), while some courses (e.g., language and sports courses) award 1 credit.

3-4. Course Load

On average, exchange students enrol in approximately **6 to 9 courses** per semester. In compliance with Japanese student visa regulations, enrolment in a minimum of 6 courses is mandatory; however, there is no maximum limit on the number of courses students may take.

Students are **responsible** for confirming with their home university whether credits earned at Gakushuin can be transferred.

3-5. Transcript Issuance Schedule

The transcript will be sent by email to exchange students and their home universities according to the following schedule.

- ◇For students completing their programme in the first semester: **Mid-September**
- ◇For students completing their programme in the second semester: **Late March**

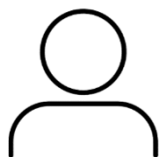

How to use “G-port” (Syllabus Viewing System)

G-Port is the system for course registration and syllabus viewing.
To check the course syllabus, follow the steps below.

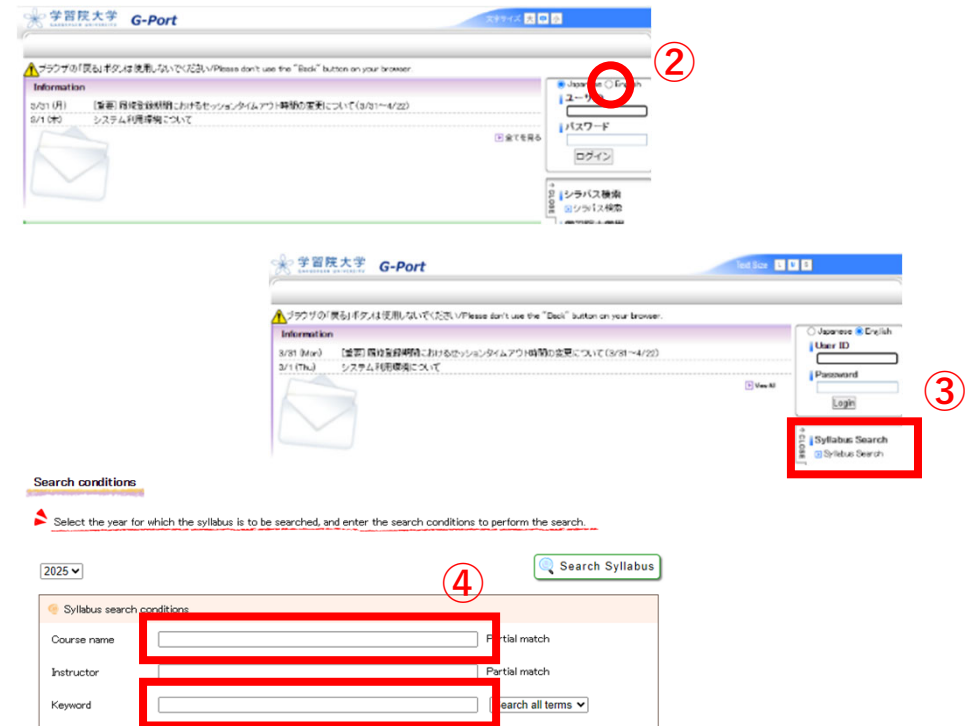
① Access the link

② Select “English”

③ Click on “Syllabus Search”

④ Enter information in “**course name**” or “**keyword**” of other fields, then click “Search Syllabus.”

5-1. Estimated Expenses (for a Student Living Alone in Tokyo)

① Living Expenses (excluding rent)

Around 50,000 to 100,000 yen per month, including food, daily necessities, phone bills, and utilities.

② Study Materials

Around 15,000 yen per year for textbooks.

③ Commuting (Train Pass)

Around 5,000 yen per month.

④ Rent

Initial cost: Around 200,000 yen (one-time payment at move-in).

Monthly rent: Around 100,000 yen (including utilities).



5-2. Financial Support

①Tuition Waiver

Based on inter-university agreements, tuition fees at Gakushuin University are fully waived.

②Scholarship

A lump-sum scholarship of up to 60,000 yen is provided for one-semester study, and up to 120,000 yen for one-year study.

Students may apply after arriving in Japan.

③Accommodation Subsidy

For students staying in designated housing, a monthly subsidy of up to 50,000 yen is provided.

Students may apply after arriving in Japan.



6-1. Students Support System

① Buddy System

Two or three Japanese student buddies are assigned to each exchange student to support them throughout their stay.

② Student Assistant (SA) System

Student Assistants (SAs) offer one-on-one support for exchange students' Japanese language learning, under the guidance of the instructors in charge.

③ Writing Support

The Learning Support Centre helps exchange students improve their Japanese writing in assignments, reports, and presentation materials by working with them individually.



6-2. Cultural Experiences

① Traditional Japanese Arts Study Trip

We offer study trip featuring traditional Japanese performing arts, such as Kabuki and Bunraku. Students also experience traditional Japanese culture, such as calligraphy.

② One-day Bus Tour

To help exchange students deepen their understanding of Japanese history, culture and society, we hold one-day bus tours to historical places in and around Tokyo. Past destinations have included Mt. Fuji, Nikko, Hakone, and Kamakura.

③ Short-term Homestay / Home Visit

We offer a short-term homestay and home visit programme to help exchange students and Japanese host families get to know each other better. Homestays last up to one week.



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6-3. Exchange Activities

① Chat Room

A lunchtime event where exchange students and Japanese students chat in the exchange students' native languages.

② Japanese Culture Experience Week

An event organized by Japanese student volunteers to promote understanding of Japanese culture.

③ Cultural Experience Week

An event where exchange students introduce their home countries and cultures to Japanese students.

④ Local Volunteering

An opportunity for exchange students to participate in local volunteer activities.

⑤ Other Activities

Additional exchange events are held throughout the year, providing opportunities for Gakushuin University students and exchange students to interact.

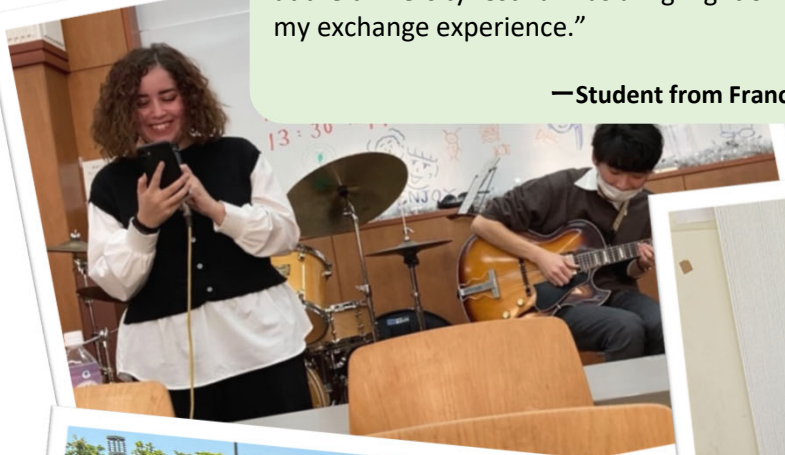

8-1. Application Process

8-2. Available Study Tracks

Starting with admissions for **Fall 2027**, exchange students should choose one of the following two Tracks.

Track A

This track follows the same application framework as in previous years. In principle, applicants are required to fulfil at least one of the Japanese language requirements stated on the next page.

Track B

No Japanese language proficiency is required at the time of application. Students in Track B enrol in English-taught courses listed in Appendix A. They are not permitted to enrol in courses outside this designated list.

Students who wish to take Japanese language courses, but do not meet the Japanese language requirement for Track A at the time of application, are strongly encouraged to apply for Track A and complete our Japanese Language Preparatory Courses (JLPC) before arrival in Japan.

8-3. Japanese Language Requirement (Only for **Track A**)

Students applying for **Track A**

must satisfy at least one of the following requirements in principle:

- ① To have studied Japanese **for 2 years or more** before coming to Gakushuin.
- ② To have passed the **Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) Level N4** or higher (or possess equivalent proficiency).

8-4. Japanese Language Preparatory Course (JLPC)

Students who do not meet either of the Japanese language requirements and wish to take Track A must complete JLPC.

JLPC is a free online Japanese language course offered by Gakushuin University for six months prior to students' arrival at Gakushuin University. The course mainly focuses on self-study, with a one-hour meeting session held once a week.

【Note】

The JLPC is free of charge. It is a self-directed learning programme, with a total study time of approximately 200 hours. There is no final exam, but poor participation may affect your eligibility for the exchange programme.

8-5. Requirements for the Faculty / the Graduate School of International Social Sciences

Applicable to:

- **Track A** students applying to the Faculty / the Graduate School of International Social Sciences
- All **Track B** students

Applicants must satisfy **both of the following requirements:**

A. English Proficiency

Applicants must satisfy at least one of the following:

- ① Have a **TOEFL iBT score of 80 or above, or an IELTS score of 6.0 or above.**
- ② Be enrolled at a partner university where **English is the primary language of instruction.**
- ③ Be a **native speaker** of English.

B. Academic Major

Applicants must be majoring in a social science discipline (e.g., Law, Economics, Business, or Sociology) at their home university.

① Do I need Japanese language proficiency?

As a general rule, we require Japanese language proficiency. However, for students who have no prior experience learning Japanese but strongly wish to study at Gakushuin University, we offer the JLPC course. Completing this course fulfils the Japanese language requirement.

As stated in Section 8.2, starting with the Fall 2027 application cycle, students may apply under Track B, which does not require Japanese language proficiency.

② Where and when do exchange students apply for financial assistance?

Applications are submitted during the orientation programme held after arrival in Japan.

③ Can one-semester exchange students earn credits for full-year courses?

No. Instead, an Evaluation Sheet will be issued to document the student's performance.

④ Are there courses taught in English in all faculties and graduate schools?

Outside the Faculty of International Social Sciences, only a limited number of courses are taught in English.

⑤ Can exchange students take Japanese-taught courses regardless of their Japanese proficiency?

Since Japanese-taught courses are specialised, a JLPT N3 level or higher is generally required.

Through this class, students will be able to understand why international migration occurs, how immigrants transform both sending and receiving societies, and the reaction of host countries.	ISS	TAMAKI EMI
Tue.	3	3	Health Economics	This course provides an introduction to the principles of health economics. It demonstrates how economic concepts and theories can be used to illustrate issues related to health, health care, and health policy. We will discuss major topics in health economics and some ongoing debates over health care issues and policies, including the covid-19 pandemic, economic determinants of health, the market for medical care and health insurance, the role of government in health care, and the impacts of environment on public health.
